The basic tools for getting started.

If your just getting started fly tying, be prepared - it's a craze! - an enjoyable one, though. As you progress, you will probably sink more money here than in the I.R.A. of your dreams. To get started, however, I have listed some of the basic tools of the trade that will make the learning experience more enjoyable. One thing to always keep in mind is, no matter what stage of tying talent you're at, is to be patient and control your temper The mark of a good tier is one who never gets frus-

trated.

Vise. There is a wide variety here, with a wide range of prices. Choose one that suits your personal needs and can accomodate a variety of hook sizes. Make sure the jaws are hardened steel so they don't lose their shape or grip, and make sure the lever/cam is away from the jaws so that it doesn't interfere with your tying. Pedestal and C-clamp models/ are available - ensure the C-clamp is wide enough to accomodate a var

iety of table thicknesses. Scissors. Sink a little more money in these than you first might anticipate. You'll appreciate it later. Have a larger, rugged pair on hand for trimming tinsel and lead wire. Hackle Pliers. Make sure they are easily workable, but

have a secure grip. Inspect the jaws for sharp edges that may cut your hackles. Rubber jawed models are good for beginners. Bobbin. I prefer the standard

spring steel models rather than the more cum bersome screwtension models. Check the tube for rough edges. Bodkin. Very handy.

FLY-TYING SESSION: Bring your vise and some materials, if you have them, to tie a few flies. We will have some extra vises and materials on hand for those of you who don't have any equipment, but have the desire to experiment and learn. This will be a casual learning experience for all. We will try to spread out the more experienced tiers at several tables, allowing everyone to share in the knowledge and techniques of others. Experienced tiers should bring materials for one or two of your favorite patterns, so we can all learn some of the

MARCH - TIP OF THE MONTH

What better way to start off our first T.U. Newletter and early season than with an effective early season pattern developed by one of the Co-founders of Trout Unlimited. GRIFFITH'S GNAT is an easily tied, impressionistic pattern

which is very effective during early season Midge hatches.

Here's the recipe:


Hook: Sizes 14 - 18, Mustad 94833 or 94840

Sizes 20 - 24, Mustad 94842

Thread: Prewaxed, black - 6/0 or smaller.

Body: Peacock herl. Hackle: Grizzly, palmered.

Other body colors in place of herl can be used. Gray, black, brown, blue dun, yellow and olive work well. You may also substitute dun or brown hackle. Try trimming the bottom hackle for a flatter float, and fish dead drift, or with a slight twitch.



The tale has it that this fly was developed by George Griffith, who, along with Art Neumann, were two early pioneers in the movement that ultimately evolved into Trout Unlimited.

Supposedly, these flys imitate pupating Chironomus - who knows for sure....

THEY DO WORK! Next time you notice some mid-afternoon midge activity, tie one on and watch closely....
