Trout Fly Pattern of the Month by Jerry Case

Frank Sawyer was an English river keeper and nymph fisherman. His book, *Nymphs and the Trout*, is a classic full of a lifetime of keen observations of trout, insects and limestone streams.

As most of our great Missouri trout waters are spring fed limestone streams, I've found Sawyer's methods and patterns to be relevant even though he wrote primarily on European fishing.

Sawyer's most famous trout fly pattern is probably the Pheasant Tail Nymph, but he also invented a fly he called Sawyer's Killer Bug. The Killer Bug has been a terrific pattern for me all over the U.S. in streams and lakes.

The Killer Bug was originally designed as a grayling fly, but it works just as well for trout. It is one of about a dozen patterns that I would never want to be without. This simple yarn nymph successfully fishes as a caddis, cranefly or beetle larva, scud, shrimp or sow bug, all important trout foods.

I'm also convinced that at the trout parks, fish take it as a good representation of a hatchery food pellet.

Sawyer's Killer Bug

Hook: 1XL or 2X

nymph hook

#8 to 18

Thread: Brown 6/0 to

8/0

Underbody: Red wire

Body: Imported

Chadwick's #477 yarn from England.

I'm sorry, but no other yarn will do. I've tried countless other types and colors and the #477 outfishes them 10 to 1. Normally I am not that dogmatic about materials, but in this case there is something special about the Chadwick's #477 ... maybe it is the color or the material itself.

It is a hard-to-define shade of tan, beige, pink, rose and golden cream that changes colors when wet. Whatever ... it works. You can buy this yarn from Ed Storey's Feather-Craft shop in St. Louis.

April Meeting

We will meet at 7 p.m. Tuesday April 6 at the Fish and Wildlife Research Center in Columbia. The Center is at the intersection of Stadium Boulevard and College Avenue.

Attach thread to the hook. Tie on a small strand of the yarn at the rear of the hook. Wrap the thread forward to behind the eye. Wrap on the red wire over the length of the hook shank. Now wrap the Chadwicks's #477 forward to the eye, back to the bend and then forward once again. Form a football-shaped body, and tie off and cement the head. That's it.

My pattern differs slightly from Sawyer's in the method of construction but I find it works better for me. When fished, the fly frays and becomes more effective. The red wire shows through when the fly is wet and the body becomes somewhat translucent.

Fish this fly dead drift or sight fish to located trout. You may need to use some lead to achieve the correct depth and I find a small indicator helpful.

Fly Tying Notes

▲ The bucktail pattern described in last month's newsletter is the Parsell Bucktail. The name was spelled incorrectly.

▲ The antique gold Rit dye shown for the Gold Current Creeper in the February newsletter is no longer made; make the proper color by mixing one part tan, one part yellow gold and one part gold Rit dye.

TU, MDC Team Up on Trout Stream Project (Department of Conservation News Release by Nina Thompson)

Both the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) and Trout Unlimited (TU) work hard to preserve Missouri's limited coldwater stream frontage.

TU's national organization recently approved collaboration of the Mid-Missouri Chapter and MDC on several projects to bring more of Missouri's limited coldwater stream frontage into public hands. The chapter will, for the first time, help purchase coldwater streams in the state.

"Through this project, TU's local chapter will help us acquire property," said Mike Kruse, MDC fisheries research biologist. "They've done lobbying, advocacy and local stream improvement projects, but this is the first time they've ventured into acquisition."

David Murphy, president of TU's Mid-Missouri Chapter, said the new agreement allows local chapters to use national funds to pay for local projects.

"In the past, our chapter was so small that we couldn't afford to buy property," Murphy said. "Funds raised in Missouri were spent in Missouri, and national funds were not available for local projects.

"With the national organization's new agenda, we can do fundraising on a nationwide basis to fund national and local projects. Now we can go even further in helping to conserve coldwater streams by buying these properties and putting them into public hands."

Murphy said the goal of the project is to acquire property for trout management, but TU's main objective is to preserve coldwater trout streams. That's why TU will turn over property purchased to federal and state agencies.

"We're not interested in management," Murphy said. "MDC has one of the best Fisheries Divisions in the country, and we don't have the resources to do it ourselves, so the arrangement should work out perfectly."

MDC got involved in April 1992 when TU's Mid-Missouri chapter submitted a proposal to its national organization to buy some property in Shannon County. In August, TU national officials chose Missouri as one of five pilot states for the project.


