#### **BOOK REVIEW**

Winter is a terrific time of year to relax by doing some reading. When it's bitterly cold outside, it's really nice to spend the evening by the fireside engrossed in a good fishing book. However, if you are like many MMTU members, over the years you've acquired the ability to present a fly reasonably well, and how-to books just tell you what you already know anyway. What do you read when you want a book that is fishingrelated, but you're not in the mood for another book on tactics and techniques? How about a book about our favorite fish, and one about the humans who fish for them? Two such books are Trout and Salmon of North America and Deep Trout: Angling in Popular Culture. Together, these books delve into the world of the fish and the fisherman in a way no other books have ever done before. After reading them, you will come away with much greater insight into our sport.

Trout and Salmon of North America (ISBN 0-7432-2220-2) was written by Robert Behnke and illustrated by Kansas City, Kansas artist Joseph Tomelleri. Dr. Behnke writes a column for Trout magazine and is probably very familiar to you. Trout and Salmon of North America was just recently published and includes the latest information available on over 70 types of trout and salmon. The amount of detailed information on these fish that is presented exceeds any book that's ever been published. Prior to its publication, the best book on the subject that I had read was Trout (ISBN 0-8117-1652-X). Trout was part of Stackpole's wildlife series published in 1991 and, though a terrific book, was getting somewhat outdated. (One of its enduring highlights is a section called "Tailwaters," written by MMTU member Spence Turner.) My copy of Trout and Salmon of North America now occupies a place on my bookshelf next to my copy of Trout, an honor it definitely deserves. I highly recommend this book to you.

Deep Trout: Angling in Popular Culture (ISBN 1 85973 398 0) was written by William Washabaugh with Catherine Washabaugh. Dr. Washabaugh is a professor of anthropology at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, and in this book he examines the fact that our sport is one of many mysteries and contradictions. Why do we fish? What does the history of our sport reveal? What does our sport say about our society and us as members of that society? Especially interesting to TU members is the coverage of national Trout Unlimited in the book. Nothing is sugar coated, and no punches are pulled. Here is the "rest of the story" that you've probably never heard before. Fascinating reading. (If you've been wondering about Dr. Washabaugh having the same last name as your newsletter editor: Although Bill and I are distantly related and he thanks me in the acknowledgements, I receive no royalties whatsoever from sales of the book. I can therefore recommend it to you with no conflict of interest.)

*Trout and Salmon of North America* and *Deep Trout* cannot be considered "light" reading, and are not for everyone. However, if you are ready for some solid information and insights that can come only from many years of research, these scholarly books just may be for you. Enjoy!
