Mill Creek Work Day

Nick Girondo led a large crew of volunteers in building “skyhooks”, structures to provide in-stream overhead cover for trout in Mill Creek (see <http://www.midmotu.org/newsletters.htm> for a description). The crew of nearly 50 volunteers for fishing clubs and Trout Unlimited Chapters from around the state assembled 13 structures. This was estimated to save about eight man-days of labor from MDC personnel. The group also picked up trash from the Bohigian Conservation Area, and assisted Mark Van Patton with sampling invertebrates from Mill Creek.

Trout in Missouri works. That's not Trout Unlimited – its Trout in Missouri. On Friday, September 21, forty-one people showed up at Dr. Bohigian's farm on Mill Creek to celebrate with John Hoskins, Director of MDC, and several other folks and government agencies, the successful completion of Missouri Department of Conservation's acquisition of the farm and 1 ½ miles of Mill Creek. The acquisition was enhanced and, in a lot of ways, prioritized due to the donation of \$100,000 of private money through the Coldwater Fund of the Missouri Conservation Heritage Foundation.

The Coldwater Fund, of course, is not an organization by itself and is barely recognizable as an entity. It's a funnel for money (translated a lot of times as "clout") and what it really represents are all the organizations and people who are interested in coldwater conservation efforts in Missouri. The donation of money for the Bohigian Conservation Area came from the Ozark Council of Trout Unlimited, Mid Missouri Trout Unlimited, Heart of America Fly Fishers and Ozark Fly Fishers and several individuals. The people in those organizations are friends, neighbors and folks with a common vision that goes beyond the organizations they belong to. I like to call it Trout in Missouri.

And if you had been in the same little field on Mill Creek the prior Saturday, you would have seen between forty and fifty people working to build skyhooks for habitat improvement; some folks that gave money. They drove from St. Louis, Kansas City, Columbia and some more local towns, too.

We need our national organizations. They give us structure, resources and a common name to rally around. But when it comes to Missouri coldwater, we all look the same.
